FINDING AID

This fonds documents aspects of the personal and professional life – and particularly the First World War experiences – of Captain Arthur Flowers, a British military careerist and mid-20th c. immigrant to Essex County. Series I contains records and images relating to his personal life and political views; Series II contains records relating to his military career, including correspondence and health records from the First World War; Series III contains official First World War correspondence and publications circulated by the British military to boost morale. Series IV contains records relating to Flowers' wife Annie, including correspondence, a 1914 travel diary, and souvenirs of the British Royal Family.

Series I: Arthur Flowers – Personal

This series contains records and images that illuminate Arthur Flowers' personal life outside of his military career, including engagement in public debate and reflections on the nature of postwar democracy, as well as images of Flowers, his relatives, servants, and various military associates.

Series III: Military Publications

This series contains publications and correspondence mass-produced by military officials to communicate with the officers and men of the British, Indian, ANZAC, and other allied armies during the First World War. Much of it passes on praise and greetings from political and military leaders and was probably intended to raise morale among the troops.
