#### **Arrangement at a Glance**

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#### **SERIES I: The British Methodist Episcopal Church Records**, 1873-1999

#### **Series Description**

The British Methodist Episcopal Church Records trace the establishment of the BME congregation in Windsor, and offers a snapshot of the national office administration primarily during the 1980's with conference brochures from the 1940s through to the 1990s.

The BME Church officially started in Canada in 1856, however there is an indication of local activity as early as 1852. For African Canadians who had just arrived via the Underground Railroad, the church was not merely a house of worship but also typically the social, political and cultural core of the community. Little early documentation remains except for members' rolls [1894, 1903, 1905, 1935] and editions of The Discipline, including two rare1873 editions for the breakaway IME [Independent Methodist Episcopal] Church started by Reverend A. R. Green. Unfortunately for Green, there was insufficient momentum to sustain the movement and the BME Church became the preferred Church among the Episcopal population. Of note are the records which deal with the razing of the old and the building of the new church during the City's period of core redevelopment in the 1960 and into the 1970s. There are also local congregation histories as well as 54 photographs depicting two BME Conference gatherings and former BME chapels in Windsor (McDougall St.), Woodstock, and Chatham.

The national office records offer good insight into the workings of the head office. Combined with the extensive run of national conference programmes and proceedings, they are one of the more complete sets of records of the British Methodist Church in Canada, the national office and its records having been destroyed by fire in 1998.

"The Dawn of Tomorrow" newspapers provide researchers with an interesting view of African Canadian publications in the 1950s.

#### **SERIES II: Emancipation Celebration Records, 1937-1983**

#### **Series Description**

The Emancipation Celebrations Records document the efforts of the British-American Association of Coloured Brothers of Ontario and especially of Walter Perry (d. 1967), known as "Mr. Emancipation," to organize festivities in honour of the abolishment of slavery in the British Empire (1 August, 1834), held in Windsor's Jackson Park from the 1930s until the 1960s and revived in different locations and incarnations thereafter.

According to the 1948 programme,

"in 1935, a group of forward-thinking colored men and women of Detroit and Windsor met...whose sole purpose was to plan an Emancipation Celebration which would be a credit to the race...It would be, they decided, an event to which both colored and white would be welcome in brotherhood. And it was fitting that Windsor was selected as the site of this annual event...since it was here the slave found Freedom."

Billed as "the Greatest Freedom Show on Earth," the celebration grew into a major annual international multiracial event, featuring carnivals, parades, the first Black beauty pageant ("Miss Sepia"), concerts, and keynote addresses by such notables as Mary McLeod Bethune, Julian Bond, Eleanor Roosevelt and Martin Luther King, Jr. This series contains 46 photographs from the Emancipation parade, event programmes, letters patent, minutes and by-laws, clippings and correspondence. It documents administrative and financial woes as well as the unprecedented and unparalleled success of this organization.

## SERIES III: National Association of Negro Musicians – Jackson Park Concert Committee, 1955-1956

#### **Series Description**

The Jackson Park Concert Committee consisted of a small group of women from Windsor (some or all of them members of the BME Church choir) working in conjunction with Walter Perry to present a concertized version, in English, of Verdi's opera "Aïda" at the bandshell in Jackson Park. The production took place August 23, 1956, in affiliation with the International Convention of Negro Musicians in Detroit, August 18-24, 1956, and involved members of the Detroit Negro Civic Opera Company, the National Association of Negro Musicians, the Windsor Symphony Orchestra, and a number of ballet dancers. The committee/BME Choir held an open house following the concert. The series consists of a small number of administrative records primarily connected with the financial aspects of the event.

#### **SERIES IV: International Women's Committee 1954-1956**

#### **Series Description**

The International Women's Committee consisted of Black women from Windsor and Detroit who appear to have primarily contributed to the organization of special events connected with Windsor's annual Emancipation Celebration. The records in this series relate to arrangements for several keynote speakers and presentations in the mid-1950s, including Dr. Mary McLeod Bethune, Dr. Benjamin E. Mays, and Dr. T.R.M. Howard. A guestbook from the 1954 Mary McLeod Bethune event records a large attendance from both sides of the Detroit River. One letter invites the committee to create the all-Canadian Jackson Park Concert Committee whose records are in series III.

### SERIES V: Armstead Club Records, 1940-1960

#### **Series Description**

The Armstead Club of the City of Windsor was a mixed-gender athletic and social club formed in 1940, with the additional object of supporting community charitable work. Its size was limited to 30 active members, with additional (non-voting) associate members if interest was sufficient. The club was created by and for younger adults, who felt a lack of organized activity in Windsor at the time. It met formally once a month during the schoolyear (September-June), and over the years hosted dances, frolics, parties, fashion shows, bridge nights, recitals, etc. During the Second World War, when some of the male members were in the armed forces, the club sponsored a fundraising Victory Ball for war-related charitable work, including Christmas gifts to enlisted members. After falling dormant in 1945 the club was reorganized in 1946 and in 1947 inaugurated its bursary fund to assist one student per year with the costs of higher education. Among its recipients was future politician and civil rights activist Howard McCurdy, in 1954.

This series contains a variety of administrative and financial records from its early history, a history of the club's origins written in 1961, a list of scholarship recipients, ephemera related to its social events, and a small amount of correspondence. Of special note is a letter from the inaugural scholarship winner reflecting on being one of only a few Black students at the otherwise all-White Queen's University in Kingston.

## **SERIES VI: War Mothers Protective League Records, 1943-1945**

#### Series Description

During the Second World War, women from a number of Black churches in Windsor formed the War Mothers Protective League, a war charity that sent letters, holiday cards, and care packages to the young men and women from their community serving overseas. To pay for the care packages and postage, they held fundraising dinners and concerts. This series contains a small amount of administrative records, as well as numerous letters of thanks addressed to the League's members by grateful servicemen.

#### **SERIES VII: Central Citizens Association Records, 1929-1958**

#### Series Description

The Colored Citizens' Association of Windsor and District was formed in November 1928 at a meeting of Black ministers in Windsor and area, with the goal of organizing the local Black community as a civic unit which might protect and improve their interests. In July 1929 the Association's new Executive-Advisory Board was formed, to act for the general body of members in the interval between meetings. The Board met once a month in various local Black churches, and its early activities included social events and speakers, the endorsement of political candidates known to support the Black community, advocating for Black men and women to be hired in various public and private sector positions, lobbying and boycotts in response to local instances of racial discrimination, and welfare work during the Great Depression. It was renamed the Central Citizens' Association in 1931 but continued its work in the same vein. By 1937 it sponsored a variety of clubs including Recreation, Dramatics, Business, Music, Current Events, Juniors, and Science, Arts & Crafts, while also containing standing committees on Programme, Employment, Ways & Means, Membership, and Drafting [of correspondence?].

This series contains meeting minutes of the Executive-Advisory Board, correspondence relating to civil liberties and wartime charities like the Red Cross and Knights of Columbus, and brief histories of the association.

#### **SERIES VIII: Lydian Association of Windsor, 1867-1881**

#### Series Description

The Lydian Association of Windsor was a mutual aid society formed by "the Ladies of Windsor" in the later-19<sup>th</sup> century, to assist members in times of illness. Each member paid an initial membership fee and then monthly dues into the association, and in return was entitled to personal care by other members and the sum of \$1.00/week in times of personal illness. The constitution and by-laws of the association specified that pregnancy did not count as illness, and established fines for members whose conduct was not respectable, who gossiped about other members, or called fellow members names during meetings. Meetings opened with singing and prayer, suggesting that the association may have been named for Lydia of Thyatira ("St. Lydia"), a businesswoman and Christian convert whom the New Testament of the Christian Bible records as having offered hospitality to the Apostle Paul and his companions during their visit to Phillipi.

The series consists of a single file containing administrative and financial records ca. 1867-71 and 1878-1880. These include the names of members, brief meeting minutes, and amounts paid or received from members. Most of the members appear to have been unmarried, and the document's presence in this collection suggests they were members of Windsor's Black community.
